#### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

#### **Governing Document**

Advocating Together (Dundee) SCIO is an unincorporated association governed by its Constitution.

#### Recruitment and Appointment of Trustees

The charity trustees are appointed at the AGM or during the course of the year by the Board. The trustees are appointed based on their backgrounds to provide a representative Board.

#### Trustee induction & training

In addition to attending a short induction session, all new members of the Board of Trustees are provided with a copy of OSCR's publication "Guidance for Charity Trustees – acting with care and diligence" when appointed. Development days are held annually.

#### Organisation

Day to day management of the charity is delegated to the Director, Carina Mitchell. The Board of Trustees meets every six weeks, or more frequently if required, to review all aspects of the Charity's affairs. The Director attends the meetings of the Board of Trustees to report on the charity's activities and participate in strategic discussions.

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

The objectives of the charity are:

the relief of need and to promote the benefit of persons with learning disabilities and/ or complex communication needs and/ or autistic spectrum disorder, living in Scotland by:

- endeavoring to improve the conditions of life for people with learning disabilities and/ or autistic spectrum disorder;
- seeking to safeguard and promote the integrated living of members with learning disabilities and/ or autistic
  spectrum disorder of any kind and, by action, change and remove the constraints imposed on such persons by
  society and authority;
- promoting the understanding and awareness of the rights of members with learning disabilities and/ or autistic spectrum disorder of any kind, their families and their carers;
- representing the views of its members through the support of a User Views Involvement Group or collective advocacy. Defend and safeguard people with learning disabilities and/or complex communication needs and/or autism spectrum disorder's human rights through collective advocacy to have a stronger voice and to have as much control as possible of their own lives. Help the person/group to get the information they need to make real choices about their circumstances and support the person/group to put their choices across to others. An Independent advocate may speak on behalf of people who are unable to do so for themselves;
- the advancement of education through the development of awareness raising sessions, workshops and training on various topics to include imaginative communication, reconciliation, disability awareness, inclusion, safety and person-centered approaches through "Tutti", our learning and innovation brand;
- And in furtherance thereof, doing any other lawful act which will further the stated objectives of Advocating Together (Dundee) SCIO.

#### ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

During the year the charity has:

- Offered our views to the city's Health & Equalities officer on health services working with people with LD/ASD
- Contributed to the redesign of the part-time supported education programme at Dundee & Angus college
- Played a role on the Keys to Life expert group
- Offered our experience and suggestions at an event on the Mental Health & Learning Disability Service Redesign
- Took part in a consultation about changing the laws surrounding Hate Crime
- Acted as Meeters & Greeters at an event at the V&A to celebrate the Rank Foundation place-based project
- Taken on a Professional Advocacy contract from the Dundee Health & Social Care Partnership.
- Become recognised for the Saltire Awards, which celebrate young volunteers.
- Signed up additional Keep Safe Places, before handing lead responsibility to Police Scotland.
- Hosted a Dundee Safe Place Initiative Engagement Event, focused on research findings from University of Dundee.
- Undertaken initial work in the development of our "Tutti" educational offer with support from The Rank Foundation.
- Developed our team of Communication Champions to quality check Keep Safe Places with support from Dundee City Council's Common Good Fund.

#### FINANCIAL REVIEW

The charity has made a deficit for the year under review amounting to £901 (2018 - £9,870 surplus), which has been transferred to reserves. The level of unrestricted reserves held as at 31 March 2019 was £44,001 (2018 - £36,798) and a further £23,560 (2018 - £31,664) of restricted funds were held.

#### Reserves Policy

The Board of Trustees has adopted a reserves policy which ensures the charity's continuing ability to meet its objectives.

#### PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIODS

During the year 2019/20 we shall:

- Continue to develop our Professional Advocacy role with particular focus on people in institutional care.
- Continue to develop the role of our Communication Champions.
- Continue to develop 'TUTTI' our learning and innovation brand which celebrates diversity and inclusion, striving to create communication exchange where everyone's voice is heard.
- Continue to develop our members, Charity Trustees, volunteers, Staff including permitted support employee's knowledge and competencies collectively and individually.
- Continue to play an active role in the Mental Health, Learning Disability Re-Design.
- Focus on volunteer recruitment and development to support the function of our self-advocacy groups.

### Report of the Independent Examiner
